Purpose

Santa Cruz River Research Days is designed as a venue for learning. We aim to: 1) trigger new research questions; 2) promote networking; 3) catalyze new collaborative projects; and 4) foster awareness of each others' research and conservation efforts. The original vision for Research Days was to allow sharing of experiences and results across institutional barriers and disciplines.

Background

Santa Cruz River Research Days grew out of a Tumacácori Information and Exchange Day held at the Tumacácori National Historical Park in 2005. There was a break between approximately 2006 and 2008. In 2009, the meeting expanded to include research exchange for the stretch of the river flowing through Santa Cruz County. By 2011, more abstracts were being submitted from the portions of the river in Pima County, and the topical and geographic scope broadened again. The event also shifted from pure research to include outreach and on-the-ground restoration projects. In 2013, the annual event further expanded to two days and formally broadened its scope to include cultural resources. Each change in meeting scope has resulted from growing interest in the event by a myriad of stakeholders. For now, the geographic scope of Research Days is focused on the U.S. Santa Cruz River mainstem. Increasing the geographic focus to include the Mexican portion of the Santa Cruz River is a goal for the future.

Special Symposium: Agua Dulce - The Santa Cruz River Heritage Project

This year's symposium is centered on a concept proposed by Tucson Water. This proposal would utilize a portion of the City's reclaimed water to restore flows in the downtown stretch of the Santa Cruz River. This concept is currently known as "Agua Dulce." Symposium attendees will learn more about this proposal, the history of this stretch of the river, and what such a project will have to consider to be successful.

The symposium includes a primary presentation about the proposal and a series of presentations on related topics. Concluding with a moderated panel discussion, presenters will discuss the idea together and answer questions from the audience. Audience members can participate by submitting questions on cards that are collected throughout the presentations. These questions will be used to help facilitate the discussion.


