FROM COLORADO TO THE BORDER - WE'RE GROWING WATER SMARTER

Our Growing Water Smart team has been in full swing as we gear up for our 11th Colorado Growing Water Smart Workshop where community leaders in Fort Collins, Fort Lupton, Lafayette, Larimer County, Johnstown, Mead and Little Thompson Water District will come together to solve water and land use issues unique to each community. In August, our border water smart program released **a full report (in English and Spanish)** documenting the Ambos Nogales Growing Water Smart workshop that took place in June. This report describes all the key workshop details, discussions from presentations and work sessions, and relevant outcomes from the action plans of participating teams. As our first binational workshop between sister city border communities, we are excited to leverage these learnings to improve our workshops and continue to support cross-border communities in the future. Our next binational workshop will be between the communities of Calexico and Mexicali on November 19-20 in Mexicali.

ECOLOGY IN ACTION!

At the beginning of August, eight members of the Sonoran Institute Mexico team participated in a bird-watching training with Mujeres en Parvada in Ensenada. This training aimed to enhance their skills for leading bird-watching workshops and community events at our urban wetlands and restoration sites.

Earlier in the month, the team distributed information about the Mexicali Fluye initiative to the community in Colonia Solidaridad Social in Mexicali. On August 27, we hosted a consulting forum focused on agricultural water reuse as part of the Las Arenitas project, funded by The Nature Conservancy and the Gonzalo Río Arronte Foundation. Additionally, we hosted a virtual conference, "Mexicali Flows, The History Continues." Project Manager Claudio Hernandez and Community Participation Coordinator Iliana De Jesús, highlighted the achievements and ongoing efforts of the Mexicali Fluye initiative.
